Most countries in the world have agreed to do this.

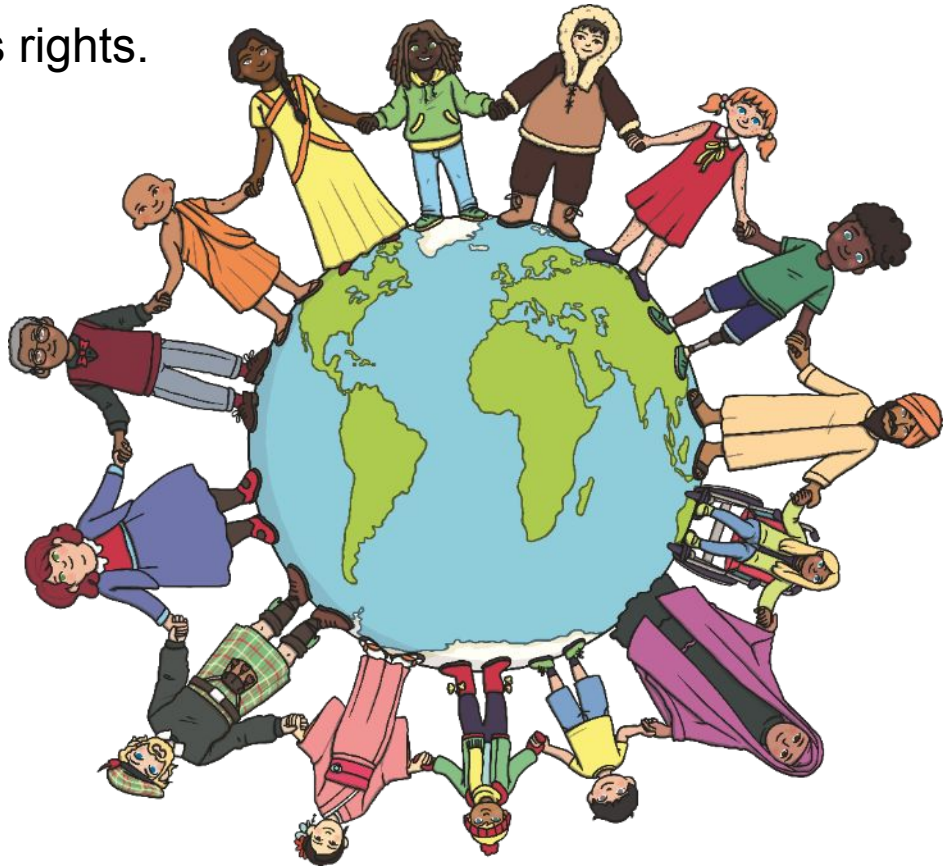


What are Rights?

Children's Rights?

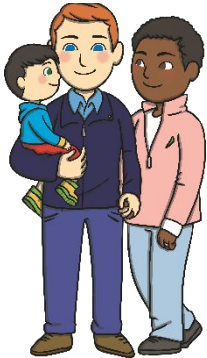
You have the right to:



be alive and grow up safely into an adult;



a name, a nationality and to be cared by your parents if possible;



see both of your parents if they have separated, if this is safe for you;

Children's Rights?

You have the right to:



be listened to;



your own beliefs and to choose your own religion;



meet up with other children and join groups;

Children's Rights?

You have the right to:



be safe and not be hurt by your parents or carers;



safe carers to live with, in case you can't be looked after by your family;



be helped to join in and be part of the community if you have a disability;

Children's Rights?

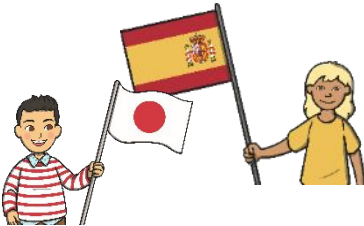
You have the right to:



be healthy by getting the best possible health care, clean water and nutritious food;



go to school and get an education;



speak the same language as your family, even if this is different from the language that most people speak where you live;



play, relax and enjoy different sports and hobbies.
